Title – Mother's Day and the Christian Connection	Resources 'Mother's Day and the Christian Connection' ppt. 'Mother's Day and the Christian Connection' text.	

Summary of Key Learning Events and Instruction

Teacher shows the ppt 'Mothers' Day and the Christian Connection'.

Teacher presents Essential Question 1 (EQ1) - Who is Mothers' Day for? (Mother, child/ren, shopping centres)

Class reads through 'Mothers' Day and the Christian Connection as

- Modelled teacher reading
- Group reading
- Paired reading

Students answer questions related to the text.

- 1. How did Mother's day come about?
- 2. Does it matter if we celebrate mothers or not?
- 3. How do mothers feel about Mothers' Day? Why do they feel that way?
- 4. What does it mean to 'honour your mother'?
- 5. What was Anna Jarvis wanting us to think/feel in her protest about Mothers' Day becoming 'out of control'?
- 6. How can you best celebrate Mother's Day?

Teacher presents EQ1 - Does Mother Day as we see it today truly celebrate mothers or shopping?

Students complete the 'Circle of Viewpoint' activity, reflecting on the point of view others might have, and how they might reconsider issues in the light of other people's ideas.

Students design a card to give to their mother or mother figure. Any day can be Mother's Day if we want to say thank you!
